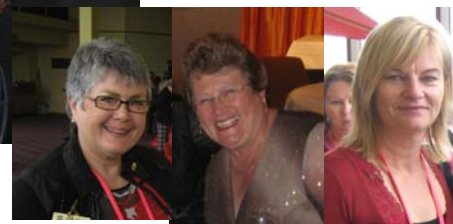
## District 23 Conference

The 9<sup>th</sup> Biennial District 23 Conference of Zonta International was held in Hobart, Tasmania on the 14 to 16 September 2007.

Guess what! Zonta Club of Perth picked up TWO awards and a special commendation at the District Conference for:

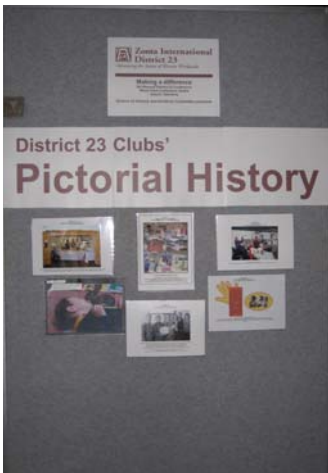
- (i) Category 4: Website and

## Lesley Parker addresses October's meeting...

*In our quest to advance the status of women, it behoves us to remember not to fall into the trap of self-deprecation when we stand up to give a talk and to be aware of our tendency to be perfectionistic when preparing a job application, as the deadline may well pass while we are dotting our 'i's and crossing our 't's.*

These were only two of the many useful tips for professional women given by our guest speaker, Emeritus Professor Lesley Parker, at the Zonta dinner meeting held at St Catherine's on 11 October.

As we soon found, Lesley speaks from a wealth of knowledge and experience. Now an Educational Consultant, with a strong commitment to Mathematics and Science, she was Foundation Director of the Carrick Institute for Learning and Teaching in Higher Education from 2004 and prior to that was Deputy Vice-Chancellor at Curtin for seven years. She was also the Founding Chair of the WA Curriculum Council. After the death of her first husband, her career became even more vital with the need to raise four sons on her own.

Lesley began her talk by making reference to the different degrees of discomfort faced by both men and women in the workplace, then highlighted the fact that, despite the best efforts of the various feminist movements, the throw-away line 'Women in Leadership' remains an oxymoron. She then framed her topic, *How to survive the challenges facing women in the professional world and how to overcome them*, in terms of four focus questions – questions she has been asked herself by aspiring leaders in various fields.

The first of these questions referred to her leadership role as Deputy Vice-Chancellor at Curtin: "What's it like?" Her response to this was, "A little uncomfortable." Curtin in 1997, Lesley explained, was an incredibly masculinist institution, thinly disguised

by paternalistic behaviour and a facade of democracy, a place where she was regarded as "A threat, a nuisance, a politically correct anomaly, and a passing phase." The male academics, she found, "Had a real problem with some upstart woman coming into their terrain."

Fortunately for Lesley, the then Vice Chancellor, Lance Twomey, was very supportive of women in leadership and, despite the many attempts to undermine her, he remained a stalwart. Lesley pointed out that a supportive male is a very important survival tool for a woman in this type of situation but that the support of women, both at home and in the workplace, is crucial.

The second question in this frame of reference was "Are women leaders different?" Here, Lesley pointed out that male leaders are always promoted in the form of the heroic model, while women are often depicted as more democratic and supportive. This type of gendered stereotyping she says is misleading, as the plain fact is that in both categories "some are and some aren't" and it can be dangerous if women buy into this type of belief system. As Deputy Vice Chancellor, Lesley developed what she titled "a post-heroic model", one that has five elements:

- (1) working to develop the best environment for staff and students;
- (2) developing a culture that supported this;
- (3) developing a "Valuing Curtin staff plan";
- (4) resisting policies that negated this; and
- (5) understanding the slow pace of change.

Lesley then turned to question 3, "How did you get there?" Her response to this was that she was fortunate enough to have been born into a family of professionals with a strong sense of social justice who

simply expected her to follow suit. At 20 she married an academic who again supported her aspirations. The fact that she, herself, is an idealist and an optimist was another advantage.

This was a natural lead-in to question 4: "How can you help us to get there?" This question, Lesley told us, has been asked frequently by both men and women. Here, Lesley suggested that women should take a practical stance and maintain, at all times, a sense of humour.

Importantly, we need to be able to deal with trivialisation, particularly in matters of appearance, including dress; and we also need to be prepared, she warned, for attempts at assassination.

In closing, Lesley encouraged her listeners to tell others their own stories of success and failure. Sharing these experiences, she said, is invaluable in helping and strengthening women with leadership aspirations in times that remain challenging, despite the dramatic shift with regard to women's rights that has taken place over the past half century.

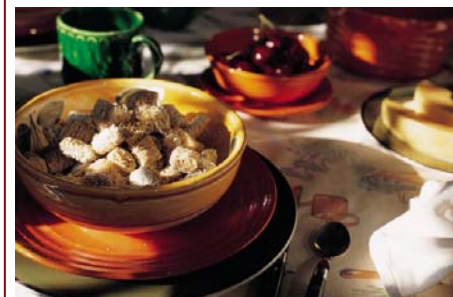

### Sad news from the Gibb River...

Nancy White's eldest son was tragically killed 2 weeks ago in a car roll-over on the Dodnun, Mt Elizabeth Road. (Our Club sends deepest condolences to Nancy and Alfi—Ed)

Little Deano, Grandson for Alfie and Nancy, was also bitten by a baby, King Brown snake on Tuesday just before sundown on the road near Alfie's house. Fortunately, he was with his brother and Selwyn who got a good look at the snake before it slithered away - they tracked it later.

Deano's mother Daly-Ann, was close by and screamed for help - Yvonne told me that Daly-Ann had the good sense to 'blow wind' into Deano, to get him breathing again, till Mary-Jane (the community nurse) got there with resus equipment. Mary Jane then set up a drip on the roadside whilst Alfi dashed and set-up the landing lights for Royal Flying Doctor plane. Yvonne said everyone was really good and sat around little Deano and quietly prayed together to keep everyone strong and calm, till they heard the Doctor plane overhead. So standby Zonta mob, your Aunties role maybe required yet again - Yvonne told me that Nancy is beside herself with grief and worry, so they are all taking it in turns to go and sit with Nancy and help with the little kids....
