1. Penny Flett – West Australian of the Year 2009

It is not every day that a Zonta Club has the 'top WA citizen' amongst its rank and on 22 November, Club member Penny Flett was presented with the West Australian of the Year 2009 Award by the Governor, Dr Ken Michael at a special ceremony at Government House.

The Australian of the Year Awards began in 1960 and, according to the National Australia Day Council, they '*acknowledge what individuals can do to inspire national pride, enrich the lives of their fellow Australians and make this the greatest country in the world. Through these awards all Australians have the opportunity to nominate and recognise those Australians who have inspired or challenged us to participate more fully in the life of the nation to make a better and more vibrant Australia.*'

Who could embody the sentiments of the award better than Penny? I know she has inspired and challenged so many...

In her own quiet way she has been a trailblazer. In a recent article in the Post (29 November 2008), it was pointed out that she was the first woman doctor to serve in the RAAF during peace-time. "I asked if I could join a couple of times and eventually they said yes:" she said. (I wonder how many times is 'a couple' and how long was 'eventually'?).

Soon after I joined the Club, Penny became President and around the same time was also acknowledged as the Telstra Businesswoman of the Year. What inspired me was that such a 'successful' woman did not resort to traditional 'male' behaviour to succeed and was living proof that you can succeed by just being yourself. Penny is the consummate advocate – persuasive and persistent – inspirational.

Penny challenges the status quo. She is passionate about older Australians and has devoted her professional career to creating a 'life' for the aged and also those who are younger but need care. She often says that she will be old one day too (won't we all) and so it is heartening to know that there is someone out there who is making the changes that will affect all of us as we age.

Penny's passion extends beyond those living in caring environments. Through her membership of Zonta she applies it to improving the lives of many women locally, nationally and globally through our wide range of Zonta projects. Penny is an active member of our Club, being a Board member and participating in many Club events. Recently she was the Master of Ceremonies for our Australian Girls Choir event and at last month's meeting presented on the Amelia Earhart Fellowships.

On behalf of the Club, I congratulate you Penny. May you continue to inspire and challenge us, through Zonta service, to *participate more fully in the life of the nation to make a better and more vibrant Australia.*

2. Sciona Browne – Halls Creek Better Life Project

Ever wondered what our 'commuting Zontian' Sciona Browne does in Halls Creek? The following snippet was gleaned from the November Newsletter of the Halls Creek Better Life Project...

Sciona began working for the Wunan Foundation a year ago, as their Halls Creek Manager. Her main task was to set up hostel accommodation for young Aboriginal workers, at Halls Creek Lodge (Old Town).

Wunan calls this 'stepping stone' accommodation because it provides trainees and apprentices with good quality accommodation and 3 meals per day – this allows them to 'step up' to independent accommodation (their own homes) as they progress through their training and working life.

A new hostel, funded by the Commonwealth Government, is due to be completed next year. More recently, Sciona has taken on the role of Manager of the Halls Creek Better Life Project. The office is working flat out to help develop stronger relationships in the community and to assist organisations to deliver better outcomes. Before coming to Halls Creek, Sciona worked with a number of communities in the West Kimberley.

7. Amelia Earhart Fellow

At the November meeting, Penny Flett formally introduced guest speaker, Jackie Davidson, Adjunct Associate Professor Physics, UWA and a former Amelia Earhart Fellowship recipient. Jackie spoke with great passion and enthusiasm about her love of physics that was triggered by the space program and the incredible journey that her career in physics has taken her.

After studying at UWA, Jackie went to the University of Chicago where, with the help of an Amelia Earhart Fellowship, she was able to complete her PhD. After graduating she became involved in experimental astrophysics at the NASA Research Centre in California. She became Project Scientist for SOFIA

(Stratospheric Observatory for Infrared Astronomy). More recently Jackie has returned to Perth and to the UWA.

Jackie spoke about her perspective of the three pillars of academia: philosophy, nature and God. On behalf of members, President Carole thanked Jackie for sharing with us some of her amazing achievements and experiences during her career, but most of all sharing her passion of physics.
