## 1. President's Report

Mary Gurgone



The United Nations theme for 2021 International Women's Day was "Women in leadership: Achieving an equal future in a COVID-19 world". That so aptly describes how our Club members dealt with the challenges of a rollercoaster year, punctuated by

lockdowns, restrictions, and a sense of living perilously.

After the 2020 lockdown, many of our members were ready to celebrate our Education Award winner in person. So, we began this Zonta Year with our first hybrid meeting at my workplace with over 20 members meeting in person while a further seven members joined via Zoom. The success of that meeting and continued hybrid meetings held at St Catherine's for the remainder of 2020 was a testament to the members' resilience and leadership in their determination to make a positive difference in the lives of women and girls globally.

This Annual Report demonstrates our members' resilience and innovation to achieve an equal future despite a COVID-19 world.

#### Resilience

Some of our established projects needed a new twist to overcome the COVID-19 challenges, and some examples of our members' resilience include:

 Postponing the phenomenally successful Women in Science event due to COVID lockdown in February 2021; the three

- women scientists from the Museum were truly inspirational in their passion for their subject and in their capacity to build an equal future for younger women scientists who want to follow in their footsteps;
- Assembling of the birthing kits across six members' homes to be able to meet the restrictions and still contribute to a safer birth experience for women globally and save lives;
- Mentoring online the women from Ishar using iPhones, iPads or computers during the lockdown period so that there was minimal disruption to the mentoring support provided to the women who often were victims of domestic violence;
- Meeting using Zoom to support the Zonta House Women's Refuge through funding, contributing to, and assembling Christmas hampers for the women in crisis and participating in the Refuge's External Relations sub-Committee;
- Using technology to advertise and undertake selection for awards;
- Complying with COVID-19 requirements, yet achieving strong participation in the Area Workshop, the Foundation Day celebration in Dunsborough, the Silent March, the Zonta Club of Perth Northern Suburbs Women in Business event, and the Rotary event to award our member, Deb Mason, for establishing the "Starting Over Support" program;
- Adjusting our fundraising strategy to meet the restriction requirements by amending our approach to our highly successful Quiz

night and obtaining member contributions when attending Club meetings via Zoom; and

 Revitalising the Golden Z Club at St Catherine's and the Z Club at Shenton College after the long-lasting interruption to the students' lives caused by COVID-19.

#### Innovation

This year our Club broke into unchartered waters with new initiatives that included:

- Zonta Says NOW to Gender Equality and Climate Action, a District 23 pilot program led by Carole Theobald, that uses a comprehensive website and online Think Tank to engage and raise awareness of the importance of having a gender-sensitive response to the climate crisis;
- The Perth Foundation for Women (PFW), led by Vice-President Ping Teo, is about to be established and will allow us to seek taxexempt donations from organisations;
- Club podcasts, instigated by Communications Team Coordinator Lan Tran, will promote our Club's good work, stimulate donations to the PFW, and promote our Club's 50-year milestone in 2022:
- Collaboration with Marr Mooditj, and the
  Department of Communities, regarding the
  Yvonne Burgu Award. We aim to raise the
  value of the award and increase applications
  from regional Aboriginal women. There are
  ongoing discussions with the Department of
  Communities to explore opportunities for our

Club to support the Aboriginal communities in the Kimberley.

#### Leadership

In our journey this year, I would like to acknowledge some outstanding members of our Club. They have leadership roles at the International and District level but continue to be active in the ZC Perth. A huge vote of thanks for all their guidance and untiring support for Club activities goes to:

- Judy Gorton', immediate past Zonta International Director and District 23 Centurion
- Sandra Burns, Governor of District 23,
- Carole Theobald, District 23 Futurist and Leadership Coordinator and Area 3, ZI Endowment Fund representative; and
- 'Tricia Summerfield, District 23 History and Archives Chair.

Through these wonderful Club members, we provided timely support at the International level, e.g. donating to the Zonta Club of Beirut after the disastrous explosion and as required at the District level.

The S&A team supports a diverse range of projects at the International, District and Club levels. Our local activity has focused on supporting and advocating for women who have experienced domestic violence and abuse.

#### **SERVICE**

#### **Zonta International projects**

Over the past 91 years, Zonta International has contributed nearly US\$32.7 million to service projects benefiting women in 66 countries by partnering with agencies of the United Nations. Zontians are an influential collective of likeminded professionals from diverse

backgrounds who come together to provide service programs that make the world a better place by empowering vulnerable women.

The Zonta International Service Program has provided training, education, health, sanitation, agricultural and micro-credit assistance to women through funding from the Zonta Foundation for Women. The worthy projects supported in the 2020-2022 biennium are:

- Let Us Learn Madagascar: an integrated program for adolescent girls;
- Ending child marriage in Africa and Asia;
- Strengthening the response to genderbased violence in Papua New Guinea; and
- Improving the health and protection needs of adolescent girls in Peru.

The ZI website has details of these project.

Our Club contributes one-third of our fundraising annually to ZI projects and this year donated \$3,600. We also thank our monthly meeting guest speakers and acknowledge their service efforts by making individual donations to ZI in their name.

#### **District 23 projects**

#### Birthing Kits at Home

From 1 July 2020, the Birthing Kit Foundation Australia (BKFA) commenced trading as "KIT International" (https://www.kit.org.au).

Due to COVID-19 and the need for social distancing, our Club took up the opportunity to assemble "Kits at home". Supplies for 400 kits came in bundles of 40 and were distributed to our volunteer hosts: Mary Gurgone, Laura Bernay, Wendy Atherden, Ping Teo, Hanna Donders, and Sue Martins.

The kits give pregnant women the gift of health and hope. Clean Birth Kits are provided free to mothers or health centres in remote communities across the globe, helping to reduce infection and improve the survival and well-being of mothers and babies.

The completed kits were collected, packed, and returned to KIT International in South Australia and sent to:

#### Club projects

#### Ishar Multicultural Women's Health Centre

Our Club has developed and maintained a special relationship with women through Ishar Multicultural Women's Health Centre. Ishar provides an unfunded therapeutic support group for women from culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) backgrounds who have experienced family and domestic violence. Each woman has a story to tell and is working to move on with their lives. They value the contribution our Club makes in offering mentoring support and friendship.

The mentoring program, developed last year, continues to grow and strengthen. Five club members continue to support their mentees, and the program has broadened to include the husband of one mentor and two members of ZC Perth Northern Suburbs.

The mentee's needs and goals guide the direction and meeting frequency of each mentoring partnership. Perhaps the best way to demonstrate the success of the program is with some personal stories.

## Personal Mentoring Story 1

(Names altered for privacy)

Sakura is from Japan, was married in Australia, and English is her second language. My husband and I agreed to mentor Sakura together as he studied Japanese for many years and understands Japanese family life, culture and values.

Sakura is in the long process of going through the family courts. She is dealing with the aftermath of ending a violent marriage and is fighting for custody of her daughters. Due to COVID-19, Sakura acutely feels the separation of being unable to see her mother in Japan. In conversation, my husband has been able to assist Sakura by bridging the Australian-Japanese culture gap. Mentoring has provided an insight for my husband and me of the impact and frightening experience of dealing with the law when English is your second language. We hope the interaction has been of benefit to Sakura.

#### Personal Mentoring Story 2

(Names altered for privacy)

My mentee, Khanh, and I have both enjoyed meeting over the last four months. Khanh is a Vietnamese lady who has 25-year-old intellectually disabled twin girls and a 5-year-old boy. Despite her highly challenging circumstances, she is resilient and positive. We meet in her home due to her responsibilities in caring for her children.

Apart from her estranged ex-husband and children, all seven in Khanh's family live in California, and she regularly Skypes with them. A carer helps her with her two girls, and a couple of Vietnamese female friends who live nearby also provide support.

Khanh can drive but does not like to go far. On Thursdays, she enjoys attending Ishar's support group for women who have suffered domestic violence.

Khanh is in the final throes of a financial settlement with her ex-husband and is also involved in ongoing family court proceedings. She requires a lot of support due to her isolation from family and limited understanding of complex English. I support her with practical tasks, such as understanding her lawyer's requirements and working with her to prepare emails and answers to the lawyer's questions.

I have learned some important things from this relationship: the discussion about boundaries and being an attentive listener. I realise she must not become too reliant on me as I am a volunteer, not a social worker, and the intensity of the current support is unsustainable.

Mentoring Khanh is very rewarding. Being welcomed into a Vietnamese home is a delightful experience, and I know she appreciates my practical help.

# Personal Mentoring Story 3 (Names altered for privacy)

It has been an absolute delight to mentor Alin since January 2021. We meet up every three weeks at a coffee shop in Joondalup. Alin uses me as a sounding board for her job, her study and her personal life.

As Alin is in her early 30's, I feel that I am a mother replacement. Her mother has since died in Armenia. We discuss the ways of the world and her sadness in trying to obtain visas for her two sons to come to Australia.

This month Alin thoroughly enjoyed her evening at our monthly dinner meeting. She met some guests who had studied in Georgia, so she was delighted. She had a fabulous time. It has been and will be my pleasure to continue to be her mentor.

# Ishar's Women's Outing to Caversham Wildlife Park

Friendship is an important aspect of our ongoing connection with the women, and usually, we schedule two picnic/outings throughout the year. This year due to COVID-19, we were only able to hold one event.

In late October 2020, the Club organised an outing to the Caversham Wildlife Park. It was a

most enjoyable day; Ishar organised a bus to transport approximately 20 Ishar ladies and a few children to the park. Several Zontians organised a picnic lunch and, most importantly, joined the women and helped the children.

Everyone was delighted to wander through the park, hand-feed kangaroos, be photographed with wombats and a koala, and watch the penguin feeding. Mostly though, they enjoyed chatting with each other over a picnic lunch.

These outings are rare, enjoyable occasions for the women; many use the opportunity to talk openly about their experiences, a testimony to the trust built over the years.

#### **ADVOCACY**

#### **Setting the framework**

In 2020/2021, as a club, we wanted to develop some guidance around our service and advocacy projects. As the Coordinator, I worked with Carole Theobald to develop a mentoring flyer and an advocacy guide. Both are available on our club website. With Val Gandossini's support, we also revitalised our mentoring guidelines.

#### **Zonta House Refuge Association (ZHRA)**

The ZHRA was established in 1984 to provide crisis and transitional accommodation to women escaping violence. To date, the ZHRA has assisted over 8,500 women.

The ZHRA developed the Positive Pathways program to break the cycle of family and domestic violence and respond to the increasing number of women and families requiring support in the wider community. The program assists women to lead more independent, safer, and more fulfilling lives.



Our Club supports Positive Pathways through service, advocacy, and fundraising. The program assists women who have experienced or are at risk of family and/or domestic violence, mental health issues and homelessness or any other crisis in their life.

Positive Pathways partner with other community service organisations to provide a holistic and one-door approach, minimising barriers to seek assistance for those in need.

Mary Gurgone, our Club President, is on the ZHRA External Relations Sub-Committee and Janice Dudley, an individual member of ZI and frequent attendee at our club events, is a member of the ZHRA Administration Sub-Committee.

Our Club has donated \$2,500 this year to the ZHRA.

#### Silent March

The Silent Domestic Violence Memorial March remembers those who have lost their lives to family and domestic violence. The event raises awareness and advocates to end family violence.

Each year, thousands of people join the Silent March through the city. Traditionally, members of ZC Perth Northern Suburbs and ZC Swan Hills have joined us.

We all wore our striking orange 'Zonta Says NO' tee-shirts with pride as we walked behind our 'Zonta Says NO to Violence Against Women' banner. We captured the attention of the newly elected Deputy Leader of the Liberal party, Libby Mettam.

The march was a powerful and moving demonstration of the commitment and

dedication of many people to bring awareness to such an important issue.

#### 16 Days of Activism

This year we developed proactive social media to raise awareness about gender-based violence during the global 16 Days of Activism. From 25 November to 10 December, we advocated through Linkedin, Facebook, Twitter, and word of mouth discussions with our networks.

Some actions that everyone could take to encourage solidarity were to:

- Pin 'Stop the Violence' badges to clothing and wear them for the 16 days;
- Call out inappropriate behaviours; and
- Be proactive in climate change issues.

## 3. Awards

Lyn McArthur



It is my pleasure to present the Awards report for 2020/21. The Awards Committee has primarily communicated electronically this year due to COVID 19, work commitments and member availability. This past Zonta year has seen many highs and

posed some challenges, as the current COVID 19 pandemic impacted our award applications.

#### **Woman of Achievement Award**

Penny Webb was the worthy winner of the 2020 Zonta Club of Perth Woman of Achievement.

Penny is the CEO of People Who Care (where the project commenced in our Club, Starting Over Support, is now located). She serves in voluntary capacities in local community organisations, bringing leadership and supporting vulnerable people, such as the homeless, people with mental health challenges and families experiencing domestic violence.

She has an MBA, a Master in Business Leadership and, as co-founder of kinwomen.com, has supported women through radio events and social media.

Sandra Burns, District 23 Governor, presented Penny with an engraved crystal trophy at the November club meeting to acknowledge her tireless contribution to the community. Penny acknowledged the great work of Zonta, having

known about us for a long time through her work with refuges and rallies against violence.

Area 3 recognised Penny at the Founders Day Luncheon event held in Dunsborough.

#### Young Women in Public Affairs Award

The Young Women in Public Affairs Award recognises young women aged between 16 to 18 who have demonstrated leadership and a commitment to volunteering within the school and community. Unfortunately, there were no applicants for the 2021 award who met the award criteria.

Thank you to Tanis Jackson, who administered this award.

#### **Zonta Club of Perth Education Award**

Our Club offers this award to women over the age of 25 who have completed at least one year of their first degree at a Western Australian University and demonstrate a need for financial assistance to complete the degree.

At the June Club meeting, our inspirational awardee, Fatemah Etemadi, was presented with the University Education Award for 2020 by ZI International Director Judy Gorton.

Fatemah described how she was born in Iran and spent much of her youth in Afghanistan. She and her family had overcome immense disadvantage, violence and poverty to turn their lives around with education. Her father died when she was 12, and soon after this, her mother made the brave move to Australia to start a new life with her six children.

Fatemah is studying oral health therapy at Curtin University and, in her spare time, is a volleyball coach and bilingual facilitator. She

helped to organise the largest blood donation group in WA and a fundraising run for the homeless. She is passionate about helping others, such as cancer patients and disadvantaged children and vulnerable families.

Fatemah's two sisters, Zahra and Marzieh, joined her for the presentation.

The 2021 Education Award is being administered jointly by Helene Jaccomard and Lyn McArthur. Applications for the 2021 Award closed on19 April, and the selection panel will conduct interviews in the coming week.

#### **Yvonne Burgu Education Award**

This award encourages Aboriginal woman to complete a university degree or TAFE Diploma.

Jill Anderson coordinates this award.

Unfortunately, we did not receive any applications for 2020, as many students returned to their land due to university and regional lockdowns. However, we have received applications for the 2021 award that closes soon.

President Mary Gurgone and Karen Groves have been exploring the possibility of collaboration to raise awareness and increase the value of the award in future years.

So far, they have liaised with Marr Mooditj Training Aboriginal Corporation, meeting with Margaret Quartermaine, CEO, and Sophie, Marketing Coordinator, with a view to Zontians raising awareness through talks with students.

They are also exploring opportunities to promote this award with law firms, colleges and programs that support indigenous students attending secondary school.

The team will hold further discussions with the Department of Community Services regarding long-range collaboration on community projects.

In addition, the team will work with the revitalised Golden Z Club to promote indigenous issues and the Yvonne Burgu Award at St Catherine's College.

## Jane M Klausman Women in Business Scholarship

The 2021 JMK Award is an Area 3 Award, coordinated by Bev McNamara from the ZC Perth Northern Suburbs. Our Club works closely with Bev to seek applications by promoting the scholarship widely. The 2020 Area 3 winner was Marina Sarkoski who is studying at Edith Cowan University.

#### Note 1: Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

The Directors of Zonta Club of Perth Inc.
